Roger Freeman Conant, formerly of Littleton, died in Taunton, Mass., on Saturday, Sept. 17. He was born in Melrose on April 9, 1909. Raised by his grandparents, Sarah and Albert Conant of Littleton, he graduated from Littleton High School and Wentworth Institute. He was employed by B.F. An avid horseman, he was a member of numerous organizations: The National Lancers, Cross-State Trail Riders, Littleton Horse Owners Association, New Hampshire Horse and Trail Association, New England Horse Owners Association, Derry N.H. Trail Riders, North County Riding and Driving Club, Harvard Horse Association and the Westford Horse Owners Association. He represented various clubs at the Mass. Department of Environmental Management working to preserve trails. He is predeceased by his wife. Isobel. He is survived by his children, Joyce Estelle Lovejoy and her husband, Peter Lovejoy, of New Boston, N.H.; Edna May Meserve and her husband, Albert Meserve, of Raynham, Mass.; Roger Conant and his wife, Linda, of Cumming, Ga.; seven grandchildren, 12 great grandchildren, and two great-great grandchildren.
